I tested it once out of curiosity (to see if it can give me some extra ideas for my paper) but the quality was super
I have used it only to create text samples for idea creation where I don't take any of the text, just read it and it helps spark new connections i hadn't thought of
Sometimes it's good but for academic literature especially it's pretty flawed i.e., with suggesting references for example. But to get main ideas about something it's great.
I have tried it but not used it often
I use it to give me some insights of subjects or if I need a very specific answer to a question which Google would take too much time to find
It's helps with small tasks but ultimately you need to put in your own knowledge.
I'm writing a paper with some other students about ChatGPT, and I think that it's a great tool! It can help you to start writing on something and putting in random prompts is funny, too!
It is a very under-utilised tool in university in my opinion. It would be nice to have it incorporated in the course as students will be using it anyways (just not admit it). My experience (not from uni but work) is that it is amazing at giving a fast foundation for working upon IF you give it a well formulated prompt. It is also very good at giving feedback on work done already and can offer a new perspective.

I make no secret of the fact that Generative AI makes my life easier. I think it is a very valuable tool that increases productivity and efficiency of work if used correctly and critically. I believe it can be a threat to academic excellence, as it can lead to skipping the processes that normally lead to a successful learning experience. However, used correctly as a tool and not as a substitute for the ability to think critically and actually learn, it can be a useful and valuable thing. I use it primarily as a source of inspiration, an organisational tool and a linguistic editor/support.
It makes it easier for people to work on general research topics, but in my opinion, in the case of preparing homework and articles, it is more important to research sources and to be able to convey your own information.
